"Can you hear me now?"

He was known as "Test Guy". We may not have known his name, but we certainly knew his favorite line. In 2002, Verizon launched a series of commercials in which a nondescript actor would walk around in a variety of places with an ear to his phone asking the question, "Can you hear me now?" It's considered one of the most successful ad campaigns of the early 2000s. We still struggle with cell reception in certain places, but none like it used to be in 2002. "Can you hear me now?" struck a chord with us because we all knew the experience of not being able to communicate in certain locations... and in our personal experience, we all knew where those locations were. Conversely, we all knew where we could go to get a great cell signal with our particular mobile phone carrier. For years, I've had dozens of phone conversations in the parking lot of a certain business here in Los Fresnos, because I know there's always great reception at that location.

Mobile phone technology. It has changed our lives. We can be reached (whether we like it or not) anytime, anywhere, so long as we have a cell signal. Always on. We don't think much about it, but the mobile phone is an example of the mobility of church, the gathering of believers around Word and Sacrament. When the great missionary Paul went to the ancient city of Corinth for the first time, he went into the synagogue to proclaim the Good News of Jesus. While some received the Gospel gladly, others didn't, and Paul was forced to go to the house next door, where his proclamation of the Gospel continued unhindered. Mobile church.

Mobile church

Church is not bound by a building. However, the way we gather in the places we gather tend to subtly convince us that the building is the church. Even I've been susceptible to this kind of thinking. I remember catching myself a few years back, on a Tuesday afternoon, announcing to my wife Emily that I was leaving the house and "headed to church." On a Tuesday afternoon. I was not headed to a gathering around Word and Sacrament. I was headed to a church building. But our nomenclature betrays how we tend to blend "church" with a "church building".

Planting a church in Los Fresnos has forced us to confront the most basic of church questions. The Table of Los Fresnos is We are "Mobile church". All of us would agree that a church is not a building, but a people. And we would also affirm with the Book of Concord that the church is "where the Gospel is preached and the sacraments are rightly administered." But it's quite another thing to put that belief into practice. At The Table, the church is ANYWHERE the Gospel is preached, and the sacraments rightly administered.

Church. ANYWHERE. ANYTIME, that the Gospel is preached and the Sacraments rightly administered. We meet in the Los Fresnos Community Center every Sunday. However, the Los Fresnos community center also functions as a precinct. About one quarter of all of our worship services are either outdoors at a city park pavilion, but also a local funeral home that has been gracious in giving us their space for worship.

Mobility by LWML


Because we are a mobile church doing very many mobile things, we asked the LWML to partner with us in our gospel ministry in Los Fresnos. Two years ago, the LWML was generous to The Table for a truck and tables and chairs for our outdoor worship services and other outreach ministries. With your 25-thousand dollar mission grant, we were able to purchase a 26-foot box truck, a dozen tables and 100 chairs. That allowed us to not be dependent on the city or the school district for their tables and chairs for our outdoor outreach events.

We use the truck every week for storing and then moving our sound equipment and worship materials to the community center. The truck and the tables and chairs have been used for our outdoor worship services at the Los Fresnos Memorial Park pavilion, our home away from home for Sunday services. We've also used the truck for our annual pumpkin patch on Halloween weekend. Last year, we gave away 330 pumpkins... and more than 12-hundred people showed up to our pumpkin patch on the grounds of the Los Fresnos rodeo. We used the truck, the tables and chairs for our annual Christmas Eve service at the Little League field. Every year, around 100 people show up from around the community to hear the real Christmas story from the gospels, and sing Christmas carols in English and spanish... with a live nativity. The truck will play an important role this summer with our #LoveLosFresnos and VBS outreach programs.

Mobile church. All of this is a reminder that Jesus meets us where we are. Jesus is never saying "Can you hear me now?" Whenever and wherever the Good News of Jesus is proclaimed and the Sacraments are provided, Jesus shows up. Jesus guarantees that we will hear him and that he will provide us with life, salvation, and forgiveness. It's not an accident that Jesus' promise to show up begins with the word "where" rather then "when". "Where two or three are gathered together in my name, I am there among them." (Matthew 18:20) Jesus is mobile. He is where we need him to be, in His Word and Sacrament delivering Himself to us all over again.


